Savage River, 25 September 2011

On September 25, Wes Bryden (K1), Phil Troutman (OC1) and I (K1) paddled the Savage River release at 1000 cfs. This was my first run of the Savage but it felt like the second since the night before I had watched Wes' helmet cam Youtube video of the entire run from a release earlier in the year!

Despite the crowds at the put in, there were no backups on the river itself. The first time down we scouted the dam near the first part of the run. I was a little anxious since, on our approach to the dam I noticed a kayak stern hovering above the horizon line in an approximately 10 second vertical pin. However, Wes and I successfully boofed the pourover about 5 yards right of the break in the dam on the left side. Several K1s ran the technical far right slot and a few braved the somewhat obstructed dam break. Phil portaged this drop.

Wes hit his roll early in the run, owning the rest of the river quite handily. I enjoyed the rollercoaster ride almost as much as that less-than-sane spring 2011 WV run of Grassy Creek with Keith Merkel and Lee Belknap. (As an aside, I am still grateful and somewhat amazed that Keith led us to that flooded gem, and even more appreciative that the strainers kept their tendrils off of us. I found it quite amusing that Lee with his ears duct-taped to protect his auditory apparatus, Keith with his glasses fogging up to the point that he had me lead (thanks a lot!) and me with my conservative philosophical views, resembled the Hear no Evil, See no

Phil was wishing for a bailer throughout the run but emerged from every drop with a smile on his face. There were enough eddies to allow for boat drainage, and we arrived at the takeout with enough time to consider a second run. Unfortunately, we were not able to squeeze onto the first two ASCI shuttle vans, but soon the third van had us back at the put-in, climbing the river side road to the tunes of the Doobie Brothers and Heart. Shortly after putting on I noticed that I had taken on some water in my usually dry boat. After the dam boof, Wes and I waited in the pool below to help out Phil as he attempted the drop. His line was right on, so I had time to contemplate the additional water that I was now sitting in. Despite Wes' advice that this was the last good place to take out if I was having serious boat problems, I decided to forge ahead.

I emptied my boat and tried to believe that my spray skirt was just not in place properly, but after having run the slalom course and a few of the bigger drops, I realized something was seriously wrong and discovered a 5 inch crack in the bottom of my boat. I knew this was coming based on the current condition of the plastic, but thank goodness it gave way on a roadside run and not the Gauley! We discussed Phil and Wes finishing the run but they graciously took off with me. We were calling it close making the last shuttle anyway, so this gave us time for a relaxed return to Northern Virginia.

Upper James River Water Trail

Botetourt County has developed the Upper James River Water Trail to encourage residents and visitors to experience the beauty and history of the river. A key objective is to protect the natural beauty and character of the river in partnership with landowners, businesses, state agencies, and citizens to promote sustainable recreation. The water trail has six public access points along the 45 miles, 14 miles of which is designated a Virginia Scenic River. The 45 river miles begin at Iron Gate and end at Arcadia; they correspond to Corbett's Sections 1-4 on the river. These sections are Novice level (Class 1-2) with an average gradient of about 5' per mile. A reading of 2.3' at Buchanan is considered zero for the run. I have paddled about 10 miles of the trail and found it very enjoyable, perhaps similar in nature to Anglers to Lock 10 on the Potomac. There are several outfitters in the area that can provide shuttles. More information, including maps, is at www.upperjameswatertrail.com.

More from Ron: 1842 Ode to Passage Creek (and a girl who lived there!)

A new book (*Welcome to Fort Valley*, by Jeanette Conner Ritenour, James Harris Trott, and Margaret Akers Trott, Fort Valley Museum, Inc., 2010) includes an anonymous poem entitled "Passage Creek." The poem, written in the romantic style of the period (e.g., Whitman, Emerson, Poe), was published in *Godey's Lady's Book* in 1842. An excerpt follows:

New information about the river (e.g., new hazards) is particularly important. **Photos** are also published. Send prints to the webmaster or e-mail digital photos to the newsletter editor.
